Make more publications open!

Aalborg University's new Open Access Policy requires researchers to **upload the Accepted Author Manuscript (AAM) to Pure** if the final published version is not immediately Open Access.

This requirement applies only to journal articles and conference papers in proceedings.

What is an AAM?

An AAM is the version of your article that has been peer-reviewed and accepted for publication, but hasn't yet been formatted with the journal's layout, volume, issue, or page numbers.

The AAM is also known as a postprint.

What do I need to do?

Upload your AAM to Pure during publication registration or within 12 months after.

How do I do it?

Click "Add electronic version(s) of this work" in the registration form. A drop-down menu requires you to set the "Public access to file" as either Open, Closed, Embargoed or Unknown. If you are unsure about this, simply mark it as Unknown. Just like "Closed" files, "Unknown" files will not be shown in the VBN Portal. We will automatically check up on this, when validating the Pure registrations.

Why is it important?

Some journals allow you to make your AAM Open Access, either with or without embargo. Uploading your AAM gives you the opportunity to make your research accessible to more people, even if the final version isn't immediately Open Access.
